# from NMR and EPR to **ENDOR**

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### comparing NMR and EPR

- smaller number of resonances than EPR, easier to analyze the nature of a spectrum
- easy to assign a resonance to a specific isotope
   you always get a resonance, whatever the environment of your nucleus

Disadvantages of NMR:

• quite a large amount of nuclei needed to get a measurable radiowave absorption

### Advantages of EPR:

• less atoms needed to get a measurable microwave absorption

## Disadvantages of EPR: • larger number of resonances

- not a priori obvious which atom is responsible for an observed resonance
   if there are no unpaired electrons, there will be no resonance.

Can the advantages of NMR and EPR be combined?

## **ENDOR** Boltzmann distribution for the occupation of the hyperfine split levels for S=1/2 and I=1/2: m<sub>1</sub> = -1/2 $m_S = -1/2$ B<sub>0</sub> ≠ 0 I=1/2 $B_0 \neq 0$ Apply microwaves that match one of the EPR transitions: S=1/2 B<sub>0</sub> ≠ 0 I=1/2 $B_0 \neq 0$
